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New from the Northwest

D.D. Barant, *Death Blows* (**April**, St. Martin's pbo, 7.99). 2nd with FBI profiler Jace Valchek, who tracks a killer who is using ancient magic and comic book figures to kill some of the most powerful creatures in the alternate world Jace now occupies. BC author.

Stella Cameron, Out of Body, Out of Mind, Out of Sight (Mar., April, and May, Mira pbos, 7.99 ea.). Three daughters were born to a family with paranormal talents. Each book will follow one of them as she deals with her peculiar abilities and how she tries to use them for good. Signing and collectors packets for each if you reserve in advance.

William Dietrich, *The Barbary Pirates* (**April**, Harper hc, 25.99). Ethan Gage is racing the pirates of the African coast to find a legendary weapon from antiquity: the mirror of Archimedes, a super-weapon of its time that destroyed the Roman fleet. Obviously, if the Barbary Pirates get their hands on it, the Mediterranean would be theirs for the taking. **Signing**.

Robert Dugoni, *False Justice* (**April**, Touchstone hc, 25.00). Seattle defense attorney David Sloane has just successfully defended a prominent pediatrician against charges in the death of a young boy. Something about the case always bothered Sloane and after the verdict a guy on the street claims to have been responsible for that death and another. And then the guy vanishes. Sloane finds out the man is a toy inventor. Why would a toy inventor be killing kids? **Signing**.

Christy Evans, *Lead-Pipe Cinch* (**April**, Berkley pbo, 6.99). 2nd with Oregon plumber's assistant Georgiana Neverall. Up to her knees in funky water, Georgiana is building a moat for a retired Microsoft exec. She'll be knee-deep in trouble as soon as she finds a body in there.

Michael Gruber, *The Good Son* (**May**, Holt hc, 26.00). Sonja Bailey Laghari and eight members of a peace symposium are kidnapped by terrorists in Pakistan. While she uses her skill as a Jungian psychologist and a Muslim to keep the hostages alive, he son races to save her. This, of course, gives you just the bare bones of a deeply complex book about deeply complex problems. **Signing. Fran STRONGLY recommends as a contender for Best Book of the Year.**

Lisa Jackson, *Without Mercy* (**April**, Kensington hc, 25.00). Julia Farentino has concerns about the academy to which her teenaged half-sister is going to be sent. While the school's reputation for helping troubled teens is impressive, Julia isn't sure. She begins to look into their practices and grows more worried. In paper, *Malice* (**Mar.**, Zebra, 7.99).

Larry Karp, *The Ragtime Fool* (**April**, Poisoned Pen hc, 24.95). Scott Joplin himself is long dead but ragtime is becoming popular again. There's a rumor that the composer left a journal of his time in Sedalia, MO. Brun Campbell searches for it, hoping it can become the centerpiece of a Joplin museum. But there are people who will kill, literally, to keep it quiet. A young piano prodigy obtains the journal, and finds that being white is no guarantee of safety in 1950s Missouri. **Bill recommends.** In paper, *The King of Ragtime* (**Mar.**, Poisoned Pen, 14.95). **Signing**.

Bethany Maines, *Bulletproof Mascara* (**Mar**., Atria tpo, 15.00). Debut comic thriller from a Tacoma resident. 26-year-old Nikki Lanier desperately wants to get out on her own and takes a job selling door-to-door for the Carrie Mae Cosmetics Company. Once employed, she's told that the outfit is really a cover for an international intelligence agency devoted to helping women everywhere. Nikki has stumbled into a world of espionage, human trafficking and weaponized make-up. **Signing**.

Phillip Margolin, Supreme Justice (**May**, Harper hc, 25.99). Attorney Brad Miller, FBI agent Keith Evans and PI Dana Cutler are thrust back together to work on the case of a ghost ship, a 5-year-old case that is somehow tied to a nominee to the Supreme Court.

Boyd Morrison, *The Ark* (**April**, Touchstone hc, 24.99). Archeologist Dilara Kenner sees an old friend shot down in front of her. Before the man dies he imparts a deadly secret to her about an artifact that will shake the world and for which certain people will kill. The next act of violence will be aimed at her and only the quick reactions of Tyler Locke, a former Army combat engineer, will save her and those she is with. Locke becomes the only person she can trust and together they will seek the answers of The Ark. Debut novel by a Seattle writer. **Signing**.

Gregg Olsen, A Twisted Faith: A Minister's Obsession and the Murder that Destroyed a Church (**April**, St. Martin's hc, 25.99). A true crime account of December 1997, events on Bainbridge Island, WA. A house fire leaves a local minister devastated; his wife's remains are found in the destroyed house. But investigators find no smoke in her lungs and know she was dead when the fire began. **Signing.**

Amanda Quick, *Burning Lamp* (**April**, Putnam hc, 25.95). From its inception, the Arcane Society has been torn asunder. The founders' relationship was destroyed by a rivalry that continues to the present. One of them, Nicholas Winters, created a legendary device of great powers and generations of Winters men have gotten great talents from its power as well as the curse of madness. Now crime lord Griffin Winters has the curse. **Signing (with special packets for early reserves.** In paper, *The Perfect Poison* (**April**, Jove, 7.99).

On a new assignment, he slides into a web of intrigue and murder involving people who guard their privacy and secrets even more maniacally than does he. In paper, *The Pain Nurse* (**May**, Poisoned Pen, 14.85), *Marie recommends*. **Signing**.

Kelly Theron, A Patient Enemy (**Mar**., Tigress tpo, 15.95). Debut novel by a Seattle cop using a penname to maintain some distance from her cases and future testimony. Kate's sister was raped and murdered in what has become a media nightmare for the family. To make it far worse, the accused is released due to a legal technicality. Kate begins to consider justice of her own and the question becomes is killing always murder? As she weighs the morality of her thoughts, the killer becomes aware of her and her potential threat. **Signing**. **Marie recommends this author**.

Frank Zafiro, *Beneath a Weeping Sky* (**Mar**., Gray Dog tpo, 16.95). River City (the second largest city in Washington State, over on the eastern edge of the state) has been beset by a serial rapist. The attacks are becoming increasingly brutal and Det. John Tower fears that this guy is escalating toward murder. The police of the town pull out the stops to find the perp.

Jennifer Crusie & Bob Mayer, *Wild Ride* (Mar., St. Martin's hc, 25.99). Paranormal-thrills and laughs at an amusement park.

Laura Crum, *Going*, *Gone* (**April**, Perseverance tpo, 14.95). 10th with equestrian veterinarian Gail McCarthy.

Clive Cussler with Jack Du Brul, The Silent Sea (Mar., Putnam hc, 27.95). Oregon Files novel. In paper, Corsair (Mar., Berkley, 9.99).

Don Dahler, *Water Hazard* (**Mar**., St. Martin's hc, 24.99). Murder and golf in Hawaii. **Lila Dare**, *Tressed to Kill* (**May**, Berkley pbo, 7.99). Brian Freeman, *The Burying Place* (**April**, St. Martin's hc, 24.99). Lt. Jonathan Stride investigates when an infant disappears from a posh lakeside home and one of his fellow

Reissues of Note

William Lindsay Gresham, *Nightmare Alley* (**May**, NYRB, 14.95). A noir classic from 1946 which tells the story of a young guy who joins a carnival. He quickly rises as a mentalist by using cunning and ruthlessness to the top of the entertainment world where he gains riches by conning the wealthy and gullible. But justice or karma or hubris goes before the fall... Filmed as the 1947 Tyrone Power movie which often is included in the Seattle Art Museum's Film Noir Cycle.

George V. Higgins, *The Friends of Eddie Coyle* (May, Picador, 13.00). A reissue marking the 40th anniversary of the book's release, touted by Elmore Leonard as the 'best crime novel ever written..."

Philip Kerr, A Philosophical Investigation (May, Penguin, 15.00). One of JB's all-time favorites: When published in 1992, it was set in the near future; now the time is upon us: in 2013, it is possible to determine which men are predetermined to be serial killers. If you are believed to be one, you are isolated in 'putative coma'. Those who are marked as 'likely' are put in a file, given a codename and watched. One of these men is not only a lunatic, he is also brilliant and a computer genius. He hacks into the file and gets the files to his 'brethren'. The code names are those of philosophers and our villain, "Wittgenstein", begins to kill the others according to his dislike for their philosophical codename. It is the job of Det. Isadora Jacowicz to stop him, and thus begins a deadly tango and a dialogue on why some philosophies deserve to 'die', on the philosophy of murder, and of mysteries themselves. A fascinating, multi-leveled story, something like 3-dimensional chess, that will keep you on your toes. Kerr was 36 when it was published! **Janine agrees with JB!**

Joe R. Lansdale, *The Complete Drive-In* (**May**, Underland, 15.95). An omnibus of his 3 Drive-In novels from the late 80s, in one volume for the first time.

Jim Nisbet, Lethal Injection (**April**, Overlook, 12.95). His second modern-noir classic, from '87. After administering the lethal dose to a prisoner he thinks is innocent, the alcoholic prison doctor goes in search of real killer.

Richard Stark, *The Green Eagle Score*, *The Black Ice Score* and *The Sour Lemon Score* (**April**, University of Chicago, 14.00 ea.) The 10th, 11th and 12th Parker books from '67,'68 and '69. New foreword by Dennis Lehane. *Bill & JB recommend this terrific series*.

B. Traven, *The Treasure of the Sierra Madre* (**Mar**., FSG, 16.00). 1927 novel of greed and violence as 3 Gringo prospectors search for gold. Traven himself is a figure of mystery as there is no consensus on who he really was, where he was born, or even what his name was. Basis for the John Huston film with his father Walter and Bogart.

Charles Willeford, *I Was Looking for a Street* (**April**, Picturebox, 15.95). Memoir first published in 1988 by the late noir writer. *Bill recommends*.

Special Interest

Rod Englert with Kathy Passero, *Blood Secrets* (**April**, St. Martin's hc. 25.99). Forensic blood expert Englert explains how blood evidence is 'read' and how that is used in crime investigations. Forward by **Ann Rule**.

Jonathan Eig, *Get Capone: The Plot that Captured America's Most Wanted Gangster* (**May**, Simon & Schuster hc, 26.00). The author was the first to get access to the IRS files on Capone and details the plans that achieved what seemed to be the impossible: putting Scarface in prison. He also uncovered new information that sheds light on the Saint Valentine's Day massacre.

Alex Butterworth, *The World that Never Was* (**April**, Pantheon hc, 29.95). "The True Story of Dreamers, Schemers, Anarchists, and the Secret Agents" is the subtitle. A history of the subversives and those who pursued them, from 1871 to 1905.

Ulrich Boser, *The Gardner Heist: The True Story of the World's Largest Unsolved Art Theft* (**Mar**., Harper tpo, 14.99). Art detective Harold Smith worked on this mysterious case from the night it happened in March1990, until he died. Reporter Boser takes up the trail.

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
