Gary Alexander, *Disappeared* (**Sept**., 5 Star hc, 25.95). Stand-up comedian Buster Hightower lives next door to Ted Snowe. Ted has an interesting racket: he captures people, tells them he's a hit man and gives them the choice of dying or vanishing. All choose to disappear. Ted then lives off the proceeds of their abandoned lives. The trouble starts when some of these people begin to reappear. **Signing**.

Maureen Ash, *Shroud of Discontent* (**Oct**., Berkley tpo, 14.00). Templar Bascot de Marins' own order is shocked when a prostitute is found murdered in its own chapel. The brothers have taken a vow of chastity. Was the harlot killed in retaliation by a Templer due to the actions of a fellow Templar or was the villain an outsider? Bascot is tasked with finding the answer. 5th by this BC author.

Mary Daheim, *Loco Motion* (**Sept**., Morrow hc, 23.99). A quiet transcontinental train trip for the cousins will be anything but relaxing. A recent and entirely annoying guest is also aboard. In paper, see **Holiday Books**. **Betty Hechtman**, *You Better Knot Die* (**Nov**., Berkley hc, 24.95). 1st hardcover and 5th in this crocheting series.

William Heffernan, *The Dead Detective* (**Oct**., Akashic hc, 24.95). 1st novel in 6 years from this Edgar winner. Florida homicide detective Harry Doyle is reputed to have a strange ability. When he was 10, he was murdered but two Tampa cops were able to resuscitate him. Now in his 30s, he is said to be able to hear the final thoughts of murder victims. And he hates murderers.

Susan Henderson, *Up from the Blue* (**Sept**., Harper tpo, 13.99). In a new house, in labor with her first baby and with her husband out of town, Tillie has to turn to her estranged father. Their problems stem from the time where her mother vanished and her father refused to deal with it. Tillie was little then and it has colored everything since.

Carl Hiaasen, *Star Island* (**Nov**., Knopf hc, 27.95). Well, there really isn't an easy way to quickly sketch this plot. Let's leave it at this: a zoned-out 22 yr-old pop star named Cherry Pye, her 'stunt double' Ann, an obsessed paparazzi named Bang, a bodyguard with a weed-whacker (!?!?), and a deranged former Governor. Jillian Hoffman, *Pretty Little Things* (**Sept**., Vanguard hc, 25.95). The 13-yr-old daughter of a troubled family goes missing. The cops figure she's gotten tired of the trouble at home and run off. One cop disagrees and he'll have to search alone to find her.

Wendy Hornsby, *The Paramour's Daughter* (**Sept**., Perseverance tpo, 14.95). Filmmaker Maggie MacGowen has one of those fantasies come true: a relative she doesn't know about dies and leaves her money. But some of her other unknown relatives do not wish to see the bequest split with an American.

Alan Jacobson, *Velocity* (**Oct**., Vanguard hc, 25.95). Karen Vail's boyfriend seemingly vanishes one night. The FBI profiler is stumped; it isn't like her cop lover to disappear. The only guy who may be able to help is a covert Defense Dept. op who has a unique ability to find info. **Signing**.

Daniel Judson, *Voyeur* (**Oct**., Minotaur hc, 24.99). For 6 years, ex-private eye Remer has been living quietly, running a liquor store, staying out of the way of the world. But, one day, the phone rings and a voice from his past asks for help. Shamus-winning writer.

Tracy Kiely, *Murder on the Bride's Side* (**Sept**., Minotaur hc, 24.99). 2nd with amateur sleuth and Jane Austin quoter Elizabeth Parker. No sooner is the rice thrown at a wedding than Parker discovers the body of the bride's universally detested aunt.

Barbara Baraldi, The Girl with the Crystal Eyes (Nov., Max Crime tpo, 12.95). Latest thriller by an award-winning Italian writer. Three perform a deadly dance in Bologna – a beautiful killer (a true femme fatale), the cop who pursues her, and a young medium who is desperate to escape her past.

Andrea Camilleri, The Track of Sand (Nov., Penguin tpo, 14.00). 12th in this Sicilian series. Insp. Montalbano awakens from strange dreams to events that seem dreamlike: he finds a dead horse in front of his seaside home and, after calling his colleagues, finds it is gone with only tracks left in the sand. Then, someone ransacks his house. What the devil is going on?

Massimo Carlotto, Bandit Love (Oct., Europa tpo, 15.00). Buratti plans to commit no more crimes and to devote the rest of his time on the planet to listening to the blues in a seedy nightclub. But an old friend needs help to find his kidnapped girlfriend and Buratti cannot say no. Past is prologue. Past is present. Favorite Europa author of Janine's.

He returns to Sweden with the boy, exposing him to all things strange - snow and mud and no black faces. But his homeland calls to him as do the voices of his murdered parents.
